Program Management

Humanities Grantmaking: Oversee one-third of the federal funding (approximately \$35 million) allocated to the National Endowment for the Humanities for humanities grantmaking initiatives in the "Sustaining the Humanities through the American Rescue Plan." Manage Humanities Grantmaking: Individuals (awards up to \$2 million), Humanities Grantmaking: Organizations (awards up to \$5 million), as well as the Digital Infrastructure program in Infrastructure and Capacity Building Challenge Grants (matching awards up to \$750,000). Assemble and convene review panels. Author committee book with funding recommendations for the National Humanities Council. Field inquiries from recipients. Administer all three programs with the support from the Office of Grant Management and Office of the General Council.

Research Fellowships: Managed the Library Company's fellowship program, which awarded 55 fellowships in 2020-21. Oversaw budgets and endowment draws from numerous private and public donors, including the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, the National Endowment for the Humanities, the Albert M. Greenfield Foundation, the Barra Foundation, the McLean Contributionship, the William Reese Company, ASECS, and William H. Helfand. Assembled and chaired internal and external selection committees, Organized virtual research colloquia. Developed the Fellows Commons, a virtual space for fellowship alumni.

Public Programming: Managed the Library Company's public programming, which included book talks, seminars, symposia, and research colloquia. Developed and hosted weekly Fireside Chats webinar series and monthly Talking in the Library podcast series (which entered its third season in 2021). Administered five continuing-education Seminars annually, which were transitioned online in mid-2020 with the seminar on *Racism & Infectious Disease*. Collected and reported data to Strategic Advisory Committee. Managed one direct report, the Events & Marketing Manager, as well as two interns annually.

Fundraising & Program Development

Innovation Fellowship Program (\$125,000): Developed, funded, and launched the Library Company of Philadelphia's multi-year Innovation Fellowship Program (2020-2024) for academic humanists and creative practitioners engaging collections integral to the library's mission, values, and institutional history. Leveraged a \$60,000 challenge grant to raise \$65,000 to fully fund the program until 2025. Assembled and chaired review committees. Launched in April 2021.

First Book Award (\$35,000): Developed, funded, and launched the Library Company's biennial award intended to recognize a significant first book published by an early-career scholar. Raised \$35,000 to fully fund the program for 10 years (2020-2030). Assembled and chaired internal and external review committees. Announced first recipient in October 2020.

Innovation Award (\$30,000): Developed, funded, and launched the Library Company's biennial award intended to recognize a project that critically and creatively expands the possibilities of humanistic scholarship. Raised \$30,000 to fully fund the program for 10 years (2018-2028). Assembled and chaired review committees. Announced first recipient in November 2018.
