Book Project

Working Title: *The Prophetic Stage: Constituting Dramatic Performance In and After Shakespeare*.

In my current project, I aim to democratize our understanding of dramatic performance. Dramatic theorists from Plato to W. B. Worthen have understood dramatic performance through concepts that mute or else condemn its multiple, contesting loci of agency and authority. I propose that the theological and political phenomenon of prophecy can provide a more comprehensive, more democratic model of the constitution of dramatic performance. Drawing on a range of sources from Amos, the Hebrew Bible's first “writing prophet,” to Giorgio Agamben, I offer a reinterpretation of prophecy that finds in it an intuition of the sorts of plurality and difference that inhabit dramatic performance. This intuition is registered in prophecy's “literary” dimension—its ambiguous and even assaultive significations, its resistance to interpretation and fulfillment—in ways that shed light on dramatic literature's participation in performance. Reevaluating dramatic performance through prophecy is particularly important to our understanding of Shakespearean drama. My central chapters track his development of what I call a *prophetic dramaturgy* out of the resources of his political, linguistic, and dramatic milieus. I argue that the critical neglect of this prophetic dimension of Shakespearean dramaturgy has helped to determine—just as renewed attention can help to redress—one of the more recalcitrant features of our critical landscape: the standoff of “page versus stage” that even now endures, long after this controversy's heyday. My concluding chapters discuss current dramatists who explore and exploit a prophetic dramaturgy: Kirk Lynn, especially in his collaborations with the Austin, Texas–based Rude Mechanicals, and Suzan-Lori Parks.
